I. General

The basic four-year plan above covers the Bachelor of Arts requirements for conflict analysis and resolution at George Mason University. Please be aware that course scheduling at George Mason University Korea is heavily influenced by the four-year plan above. Students wishing to make changes to the four-year plan above are highly recommended to do so with the assistance of an academic advisor.

II. Important notes

- 1) **Bold courses are required** to be completed prior to going to the Fairfax campus. Failure to complete required courses can result in the delay of requisite permission to study at the Fairfax campus.
- 2) *Italicized courses are recommended* to be completed prior to going to the Fairfax campus.
- 3) Conflict analysis and resolution students must take at least seven credits of Natural Science (i.e., one four-credit lab course and one three-credit non-lab course).
- 4) 120 credits are required for graduation, with at least 45 of those credits coming from upper-level courses (i.e., 300 and/or 400-level courses).
- 5) Please be aware that some upper-level courses in CONF may alternate by semester.
- 6) Please speak with an academic advisor to discuss declaration of the required conflict analysis and resolution major concentration.
- 7) Students interested in declaring a second major concentration, double major, and/or minor must first speak with an academic advisor from the respective department/s.
- 8) Students may obtain a foreign language waiver by placement test, documentation, or other. Only testing out of a foreign language (e.g., Korean) at the 250 level (i.e., into the 300 level) will grant three 250-level language credits in the tested language. The placement exam is currently only available in Fairfax. Please see <https://mcl.gmu.edu/placement-testing> for more information.
